### Dave Rothweiler, Bone Yard Pots

The clay pieces, pots and test tiles are the working ideas in back of a fine pottery piece. All the configurations of testing glaze recipes/formulas, finding a clay body to fit the artistic ideas and then playing with glaze qualities to embellish the pottery form are the play box tools I think with. There are many stories a broken pottery piece may tell the artist, and I do my best to listen/think of where next to go. Some of the pottery vessels have weathered outside my home for a good 10 plus years. Many people have stopped to look at the pottery bone yard as they walk up the side walk. I am uncertain of what they are thinking, although it is interesting to view their expressions and gestures. For me that is the real beauty.

I want my pot to ascend, to reach onto a space where there are no clear answers.. The designs that circle the pot are exponential in meaning. The meaning that at one time seem so trivial, now loaded in implications that have truly shaped my life. For example, I pick an apple high in the tree, with a cool autumn wind pressing against my cheek, then as I toss the apple down to my mother, she makes a catching gesture and our eyes meet with laugher. I love those moments now. It is my hope the pots reflect that same love.



human populations have grown and become more dependent on commercial agriculture and food production, monocrop fields have become dominant in areas once rich in biodiversity. Corn, soybeans, and wheat are three of the very few crops that humanity is completely dependent on. Furthermore, only a small handful of corporations have near complete control over seed and pesticide production. Without any sort of biodiversity, society faces risk of sudden crop die-off with the appearance of any disease or virus. This installation, titled "Heterogeneity," serves to demonstrate the necessity of a biodiverse ecosystem and rich soil, and to shed light on the many species that are at risk under the practices of commercial agriculture as well as the death of agriculture itself.
