

Annihilation by John Sanford

A nuclear bomb and its detonation is an object beyond the comprehension of human under-




standing. Nuclear weapons exist at time scales and physical scales, both too small and too large for a human to fully perceive. A chain reaction of atoms and subatomic particles collide and split in a millionth of a second to create a blast miles wide. It renders landscapes inhospitable for tens of thousands of years with subatomic particles that corrupt our DNA. My work is about anxiety over the cold war turning hot again. This work is created in the background of growing up in this landscape during a post-cold war America. While the threat of nuclear annihilation disappeared with the fall of the Soviet Union, the hundreds of nuclear weapons remained buried in the prairie, waiting for the next enemy to emerge. It brings to question, why is the fate of every living being on the planet that lives or will ever live, burdened with the consequences of a handful of extremely powerful and often careless men?
